Executive Summary: 2021 Year in Review

Dear OGS Stakeholders,

2021 is OGS's 40th year anniversary! It's been another whirlwind year at OGS, but one word I think best sums it up is "faithfulness." We continue to not only survive but thrive during the pandemic, capitalizing on opportunities to refine our existing programs and develop new programs for the future. Our executive team and staff continue to cohere as we focus on the three goals I was called to when I became president of OGS: Heal the Wounds, Restore the Foundations, and Adapt for the Future. These three overarching goals will continue to guide us in the years to come, but we can pause to marvel at what we've accomplished so far. I can't think of a better way to celebrate 40 years of our mission!

Thanks to your help, the balance on our Line of Credit debt is ZERO. When I became president in 2020, I asked for help in establishing a "fresh start" from debts of the past. Through faithful giving from OGS stakeholders, reducing expenses, increasing revenue, and strategically allocating resources, we successfully paid off the entire \$90,000 of debt this calendar year! You can know with confidence exactly how your donations were used. With this debt eliminated, we are now working on addressing other sustainability issues to ensure OGS has a strong foundation for the long-term. We have not had to accumulate any additional debt and we have a realistic budget to ensure stable operations. Thank you especially to my team who have worked tirelessly to faithfully move OGS forward.

We continue to strengthen and expand. It's hard to overstate the case of another incredible year of continuing stabilization and acceleration we've experienced (Ephesians 3:20). We achieved approval from THEC and TRACS for our new Doctor of Social Leadership degree, implemented the Gracism Studies Certificate, enhanced our delivery systems, and distributed more than \$100,000+ in grant relief and technology to our students during the pandemic. I believe we're also implementing our "Oxford Method for Educating Graduate Adult-Learners" (OMEGA) more faithfully than we have in many years.

I would be remiss if I didn't again thank everyone who has faithfully laid stones in the foundations of OGS over the years. Many people have made great sacrifices and led through times of turbulence, without whom I could not be leading OGS today. You are recognized, valued, and appreciated!






Declaration Of Interdependence

We, the working members of the Oxford TASK FORCE, in order to effect a major advance in American Graduate Education for Church-related professionals, do herewith proclaim this Declaration Of Interdependence.

Whereas, God uses men to do His work in the world, and

Whereas, Man can do nothing worthwhile without God's enablement:

We by this Declaration herewith invoke the blessings of God on the initiation and operation of Oxford Graduate School/American Institute of Ministry, and on our work together.

Whereas, the working members of the Oxford TASK FORCE have joined together to inaugurate the Oxford/AIM program, and

Whereas, the Oxford/AIM program is a significant advance in Graduate Education for Church-related professionals, and

Whereas, the Oxford/AIM program pledges to complement and not compete with existing schools and denominational programs of education, and

Whereas, Church-related professionals need a non-sectarian research oriented doctorate that remains Christian in perspective, and

Whereas, the Doctor of Philosophy in the practice of ministry is issued because the candidate demonstrates the practical application of academic knowledge in the environment of a professional laboratory, and

Whereas, the Ph.D. (praxis) meets not only the academic standards which recommend the Doctor of Philosophy, but the "praxis" designation represents academic achievement, teaching competence, and the ability to perform in an area of professional concentration.

We, the undersigned do herewith affix our signatures and affirm our bold commitment to work together with God to accomplish this task. This Declaration issued and signed in Chattanooga, Tennessee, on the 20th day of April in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and eighty-two.

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ANNOUNCING THE DOCTOR OF SOCIAL LEADERSHIP DEGREE



After nearly a year of strategy, planning, and development, the team at OGS has gained authorization by the Tennessee Higher Education Commission and our accrediting agency, the Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools, to offer a new degree program: **The Doctor of Social Leadership.**

This is the first full degree program OGS has added to its program offerings since its founding in 1981 -- 40 years ago. The DSL is a practitioner degree and is a subset of our existing PhD/DPhil program. The DSL is intended to provide a pathway for those who are less interested in academic research and more interested in the practical application of leading social change in organizations and communities around the world. We believe this strategic degree program offering will expand OGS's reach and help us achieve our mission of equipping Christian scholar-practitioners to advance constructive social change.

Our incredible executive team and staff must be commended for all their hard work in collaborating to make this possible. Their commitment to the mission of OGS is unparalleled and we could not do it without them. Most of all, we are thankful for God's ongoing provision for OGS!

To all our alumni, students, faculty, and friends, please join us in celebrating the achievement of add-

ing the Doctor of Social Leadership degree to our program offerings! Thank you!

The **Doctor of Social Leadership (DSL) degree** is a practical doctorate designed to prepare professionals for service in religion and society to lead social change. The program contains coursework in sociology, leadership, and Christian worldview studies. The degree is similar in scope and purpose to a Doctor of Ministry degree but designed for religious leadership in the social professions. The Doctor of Social Leadership (DSL) degree is a subset of the Doctor of Philosophy (PhD/DPhil) degree offered by Omega Graduate School. The DSL degree is an optional pathway/track with a practical/professional doctorate as an alternative with the research doctorate. In place of advanced courses in research design, statistics, and dissertation writing (upper third of the PhD/DPhil), DSL students diverge to complete a practicum project utilizing Action Research.

- Faith-oriented social workers
- Social service agency case workers and administrators
- Educators, counselors/therapists, and others in service professions
- Leaders of community agencies and safety forces
- Government workers, public administrators, and community organizers

2021 STUDENT SUCCESS REPORT

Dr. Curtis McClane Chief Student Success Officer (CSSO)

I have learned these past two years that student success is defined on two levels: Satisfactory Academic Progress being made each term, and individual obstacles being overcome so assignments can be turned in by the designated deadline. Special attention this year to these two dynamics has already led to retention of struggling students.

The CSSO role enables me to hear the hearts of our students and what they are struggling with. My role entails listening carefully, caring deeply, offering encouragement, and praying fervently for each student. On a regular basis students are contacted to make sure they are on track with their assignments and moving forward. This includes the role of the PhD/ DPhil Tutor and the new DSL Tutor.

The practical outcome of this new role is seen in retention, students feeling supported, and as a person students can contact for any reason if they have questions. I wrote and personally signed welcome cards to all of our new students. They are telling us that taking the extra step towards the “personal touch” has made a real difference. This has been a very difficult year for many of our students due to financial

challenges related to the larger COVID-19 impact on our society.


A huge part of this role has been to help each student navigate the challenges of COVID-19 without having to drop out. Financial considerations and assignment extensions have been granted that enabled the students to go forward. Moreover, because of my continuing engagement, students who have dropped out have voiced a desire to re-enter when it becomes more financially feasible for them to do so.

As part of intentional Professional Development in my role as CSSO, I just finished a course at Harvard Graduate School of Education. This course focused on Omega Graduate School being an educational “community of inquiry” and my specific role in keeping students connected and engaged. Additionally, in the spring, I had a book review published in *Biblical Higher Education Journal* (Vol. XVI, Spring 2021) that focused on technology and community building for spiritual growth entitled: “Ecologies of Faith in a Digital Age.” This resource has helped me in understanding and implementing strategies for student learning and retention.

Finally, as OGS Chaplain, which dovetails nicely with the CSSO role, I continue my intercessory prayer ministry on behalf of students and the OGS wider family. May God bless us with signs of His divine pleasure because we are continuing the OGS kingdom mission to His glory!







- Evaluating the Impact of Disinformation on Diverse and Marginalized African-Canadian Community





ACADEMIC REPORT

Dr. Cathie Hughes, Chief Academic Officer (CAO)

Building on the momentum of innovations due to the unexpected of 2020, the Office of Academics continued to prioritize initiatives for improvement and growth in pivotal areas. The virtual residency experience, faculty-student engagement, ongoing facilitated academic support, and new program development were pre-eminent. Creating the historical residency week's robust interactive participation embedded in OGS' unique and powerful DNA drives our fidelity to the details of scheduling virtual residency weeks. Each set of cores has distinctives designed to equip students with the knowledge and skills to progress toward desired goals. For instance, Core 1/A students attend the first session of each course together, and Core 5 students attend Core 7 mock proposal sessions. Scheduling incorporates video conferencing features that serve more students collaboratively and amplifies the tutorial methodology and equipping of students.

The introduction of multiple post-core week points of contact is increasing faculty-student engagement. Scheduled faculty-guided tutorial sessions are held for courses throughout the term and facilitate students' confidence in reaching out to faculty for guidance as needed. In addition to promoting a substantive sense of community, multiple venues for ongoing virtual face-to-face contact foster a commitment and ability to complete assignments and increase student retention. The well-attended Topic Talk Thursdays and Persuasive Communication Forum Paper Presentations are opportunities for encouragement and demonstrate the practical application of OGS' mission, vision, and values in the lives of students, faculty, alumni, and stakeholders from around the world.

Ongoing facilitated academic support includes the introduction of office hours with Dr. David Ward. From his background with spiritual formation and vocational coaching, Dr. Ward helps students discern indicators of calling and life mission. An appointment each term can guide students in cultivating a longitudinal perspective in their development to connect the dots between courses, research interests, and opportunities to apply their learning to change the world in personal, professional, and ministry contexts. Zoom-based Calling Conversations with Dr. Ward are available for Core 2-5 & C students.

New program development includes the introduction of the Doctor of Social Leadership (DSL), a practical degree affording the opportunity to apply theological action research and practical theology solutions in ministry, faith-based agencies, and communities.



MAJOR ACADEMIC MILESTONES IN 2021

Increased Student and Faculty Engagement

Academics Made Practical. An end-of-week all-student-oriented overview of syllabi, assignments and deadlines, developmental readings, DIAL, and general academic items, with allotted Q&A time to prepare students and exceed expectations for facilitated remote learning support during the term.

Mid-term course meetups (all programs, all cores) initiated in the Fall term: Student-faculty zoom-based tutorial sessions were scheduled two weeks before the 60-day and 100-day assignment due dates.

OGS Academic Programs Highlights

Doctor of Social Leadership (DSL) Program: Piloted this new program in Fall 2021. The DSL program is a practical degree that incorporates 11 Ph.D./DPhil courses, two pre-candidacy requirements, and a dissertation-level prospectus, similar to a dissertation proposal. Students prepare a final Action Research Project written within a theological or sociological framework from a Christian Worldview.

Family Life Education (FLE) Program: Completed revision of all FLE program syllabi to include seminal and current 2017 and newer academic resources and alignment of program and course objectives, essential elements, outline, and assignments.

Masters (MLitt) Program: Formalized the Capstone project. Offered a Capstone Course in Core C. Introduced Capstone milestones with specific deliverables, developed an academically sound Capstone template, and established a Master's Research Council (MRC).

The Core 7 Dissertation Workshop is a highly engaging and immersive experience. Accordingly, pre-core assignments were introduced and were submitted to the Graduate Research Council (GRC) prior to attendance. This new feature prepared students to refresh their thinking about and articulate their research design. Also maximizing effectiveness, preliminary review of all student research projects empowered faculty to have advance purview of students' research prior to the Core week. The preparatory assignments focused on pre-proposal/proposal review content and information needed for engagement with milestone action plan workshops, mock proposal reviews, and peer review defenses.

Fall 2021 Core 5/7 hosted 22 students, which involved

meticulous coordination within and between the cores. Core 5 students also attended Core 7 mock proposal defenses. Consensus was reported across the Core 5 student body that attending one session of peer-review proposal defenses contributed significantly to understanding how the research track is preparing them for dissertation-level work.






The Senior Tutor reached out to me to offer support completing assignments.

Richard Gamble, Registrar Report

In 2021, we have continued to make improvements to DIAL that have enhanced faculty training, student engagement, and student tutoring during the academic terms:


- **We have created two faculty training courses (FT 101 & FT 102)** each containing various resources for new and returning faculty that will support professors as they teach and engage with students in the virtual environment.
- **We created a course called The Gathering Place (AA 101) in which all active students and faculty are enrolled.** The Gathering Place provides a location for OGS students and faculty across all Cores to build community by introducing themselves, sharing information, ideas, and prayer requests, and engaging in conversations concerning topics of interest under the Discussions tab of the course. Under the Resources tab, students can access the General Helps repository, which contains useful and required materials for masters and doctoral students to use throughout the program. Students can also access links for the Zoom General Sessions throughout the term, a Zotero tutorial, and an academic calendar with assignment due dates for each term.
- **On the students’ DIAL home page, DIAL notifies them if someone has replied to one of their discussion posts.** This innovation helps students and professors respond to each other’s discussion posts sooner so that engagement with one another occurs more regularly throughout the term.
- **DIAL can generate a student activity report** in which OGS Senior Tutors can view which assignments have been turned in by a student for a particular course. This has made student academic progress easier to track for the Tutors so that they can initiate informed communication that encourages and aids students in their academic success.

Oxford Task Force Signatory and First OGS Chairman of the Board of Regents

Major General Jerry Ralph Curry, U.S. Army Retired; B.A., M.A., D.Min., was part of the Oxford Task Force and OGS's first Chairman of the Board of Regents. He passed peacefully at home at the age of 87, a 34-year military career in which he worked his way up through the ranks of the infantry, retiring as a major general. His life is detailed in his autobiography, *From Private to General, an African American Rises Through the Ranks and The Dream Continues*.



Rabbi Dr. Oswald Garagorry

OGS Alumnus and Supporter

Rabbi Dr. Oswald Garagorry, 71, died August 10, 2021 at his home on Woodmoor Mountain that he designed and built himself. He was an unusually gifted academician and man of many talents and interests. His unyielding love for the Torah and lifestyle principles as taught by Moses were the foundation of a life dedicated to the service of the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob; along with his wife Sonia of forty-nine years. In 2004, he received his Rabbinical Ordination from Jerusalem, Israel and 2005 he became the Rabbi of Aliyah Congregation located in Monument, Colorado and remained at that position **until 2018**. Oswald's life-long pursuit of education culminated in 2011 with the founding of a Yeshiva

Torah Institute in Monument, Colorado. Dr. Garagorry earned his DPhil, from Omega-Oxford Graduate School, MLitt, Omega-Oxford Graduate School, MA Teaching, MA Psychology, BA Philosophy, BA Psychology, and BA Theology. He was also fluent in Spanish, Portuguese, and English. Dr. Garagorry was responsible for the metal roofs on the buildings on the OGS campus as well as the etched signs on the buildings.

Dr. Richard A. Nelson, known endearingly to his grandchildren as Duck-Duck, was called home to be with his Heavenly Father, on April 27, 2021. Richard was a life-long learner earning multiple degrees: B.A. Psychology from Chico State College, M.A. Vocational Education from Long Beach State College, and Doctor of Philosophy from Omega-Oxford Graduate School. His passion for writing resulted in a series of published books on Work, Family, Bible ministries, Leadership training, along with his poetry anthology, "Glimpses of Life in Pictures and Words". He was the founder of Morning Star Publishing Company, and Morning Star Construction through which he diligently built multiple homes, townhomes, and commercial buildings in the growing middle Tennessee landscape. Greater than any of these accomplishments was Richard's absolute passion for the Lord and for people, inviting them in and sharing the love of Christ freely and generously. His willingness to walk in obedience has impacted thousands of lives across the world, from the US to China, Kenya, India, Laos and beyond. Richard looked past a person's ethnicity, race, or religion, and always saw an eternal soul.


2021 TRACS Accreditation Conference

This year OGS fully paid off its line of credit debt of **\$65,000** and distributed more than **\$100,000** in student tuition and fees relief and technology to its students and faculty. Through careful navigation of federal grants related to the COVID-19 pandemic, OGS has adapted to virtual/online learning and helped each of our students adapt with us. In the midst of adapting, we have also continued our trajectory of reducing expenses, increasing revenue, and stabilizing our financial situation for the future. Although more work must be done, we are in the best financial position ever.

2021 Financial Health Highlights

- ✓ **Paid Off Line of Credit Debt** in calendar year 2021 thanks to faithful giving to the “Fresh Start Fund”. No Line of Credit draws for two years in a row.
- ✓ **Round 2 PPP Loan Forgiven.** We received both rounds of the Payroll Protection Loans and both have been fully forgiven.
- ✓ **Staff Raises and Improved Faculty Compensation.** This year we provided staff raises and increased faculty compensation to competitive rates.
- ✓ **Income Exceeding Expenses.** For the second year in a row our income has exceeded our expenses, resulting positive net income.




FY2021-2022 BUDGET

Estimated Revenue: \$394,100.00


EXPENSES

HEERF Grants (Includes CARES Act, CRRSAA, & ARP)

With each iteration of COVID-19 grant funding for which OGS was eligible, our team worked diligently to ensure we maximized opportunities to help OGS as institution, but most of all our students, weather the storm of the pandemic. This created immense amounts of additional work, but ultimately, it was worth it.

Through hard work and perseverance, OGS strategically used its federal pandemic grants to support its students in the transition to online/virtual learning. Without a doubt, Sharlene Daniel's attention to detail and Dr. Reichard's strategic thinking helped OGS effectively utilize grant relief to the maximum benefit of our faculty and students through the pandemic. Here is a brief summary of how funds were used for our students:

- **\$8,000.00** = 8 of the 38 U.S. Students submitted requests for additional COVID tuition relief
- **\$61,000.00** = 38 U.S. students completed the institutional authorization form
- **\$7,650** = 51 Students Fall 2021 Tech Fees
- **\$7,950** = 53 Student Spring 2021 Tech Fees
- 55 Students Received laptop computers
- 54 Students received Office 365 software
- 37 eligible students attending Spring 2021 term classes received a direct COVID relief check of \$150.00 each
- ARP (American Rescue Plan) funding was available for distribution to non-U.S. students
- **\$12,325.00** = 9 International Students completed the institutional authorization for COVID tuition relief
